Fort Pickett Rechristened - Fort Barfoot -

DoD Mandate to Cease Honors to the Confederacy Ongoing Series in *The Phoenix*, Article 7 of 9

Background — The Department of Defense mandated all honors rendered to the Confederacy to cease, including Army Posts named after Confederate Officers. During 2023, the Secretary of Defense directed all military installations named in honor of Confederate Officers to be redesignated with names more in keeping with the social norms of society today.

The Post formerly known as Fort Pickett, VA, was redesignated as Fort Barfoot, VA on March 24, 2023, in honor of **Colonel (Col) Van T. Barfoot, a World War II Medal of Honor Recipient**. Fort Barfoot houses **Virginia Army National Guard** units on approximately 41,000 acres of open and wooded terrain. The Fort has 5,000 barracks, which is not a lot of sleeping space, when you consider a Division may have as many as 10,000 soldiers, but remember, this is a National Guard Post utilized primarily for training and maneuver and not to house soldiers on a permanent basis. In this regard Fort Barfoot is similar to **Fort Indian Town Gap, PA**.

During 1941 Camp Pickett, VA was established in the area of **Blackstone**, **VA** in preparation of U.S. involvement in World War II. The Camp was named in honor of Confederate **General George Pickett**, a Virginian, who led the famous charge during which **General Lee** ordered him to assault Union lines during the **Battle of Gettysburg** on July 3, 1863. Gen Pickett argued against the charge, though did as ordered leading 3 Brigades of Virginia Infantry across an open field nearly a mile long only to be cut down by Union artillery and rifle fire suffering 60% casualties. The Virginians in Pickett's Charge *suffered* 6,555 casualties in less than an hour of fighting. Some consider the failure of Pickett's charge a last gasp effort ordered by Lee and the beginning of the end for the Confederate Army.


So that's Pickett, but who is Col Barfoot? Col Barfoot was of Choctaw Indian heritage and a



Tech Sergeant originally in the 1st Infantry Division "Big Red One" and then with the **45th Infantry Division** "Thunderbirds." On May 23, 1944 during the breakout from Anzio to Rome, Barfoot knocked out 2 machine gun nests and captured 17 German soldiers. Later that day he stopped a German tank assault, destroyed a Nazi artillery piece and carried 2 wounded soldiers to safety. Tech SGT Barfoot received a field grade promotion to 2Lt.

The Citation for 2nd Lt Barfoot's Medal of Honor Reads:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty on 23 May 1944, near Carano, Italy. With his platoon heavily engaged during an assault against forces well entrenched on commanding ground, 2d Lt. Barfoot (then Tech. Sgt.) moved off alone upon the enemy left flank. He crawled to the proximity of 1 machinegun nest and made a direct hit on it with a hand grenade, killing 2 and wounding 3 Germans. He continued along the German defense line to another machinegun emplacement, and with his tommygun killed 2 and captured 3 soldiers. Members of another enemy machinegun crew then abandoned their position and gave themselves up to Sgt. Barfoot. Leaving the prisoners for his support squad to pick up, he proceeded to mop up positions in the immediate area, capturing more prisoners and bringing his total count to 17.



Later that day, after he had reorganized his men and consolidated the newly captured ground, the enemy launched a fierce armored counterattack directly at his platoon positions. Securing a bazooka, Sgt. Barfoot took up an exposed position directly in front of 3 advancing Mark VI tanks. From a distance of 75 yards his first shot destroyed the track of the leading tank, effectively disabling it, while the other 2 changed direction toward the flank. As the crew of the disabled tank dismounted, Sgt. Barfoot killed 3 of them with his tommygun. He continued onward into enemy terrain and

destroyed a recently abandoned German fieldpiece with a demolition charge placed in the breech. While returning to his platoon position, Sgt. Barfoot, though greatly fatigued by his Herculean efforts, assisted 2 of his seriously wounded men 1,700 yards to a position of safety. Sgt. Barfoot's extraordinary heroism, demonstration of magnificent valor, and aggressive determination in the face of pointblank fire are a perpetual inspiration to his fellow soldiers.

Col Barfoot served during 1940—1974 in **WWII and the Korean and Vietnam Wars, retiring as a Colonel** and having been the recipient of numerous medals in addition to the Medal of Honor, including the Purple Heart Medal (3). Col Barfoot died during 2012 at the age of 92.

<u>The American Swastika</u>: The **45th Infantry Division** formed during Aug. 1923 with the swastika as their symbol. The swastika has been used throughout history to represent ideas, such as harmony, one with nature, and unity, and in 1923 the crooked swastika of the Nazi Party had yet to be invented so no one had a second thought about the choice. However, once the Nazi Party grew to prominence the Army directed the 45th to find a new symbol. Chosen





was the Thunderbird, a symbol of strength. Though for a short time during the early years of WWII, American soldiers did wear a swastika patch on their uniform.



"The Six Triple Eight"

Did anyone see the new movie that just came out on Netflix titled, "*The Six Triple Eight?*" The movie is about, in-part, Captain (later Lieutenant Colonel) Charity **Adams**, the Battalion Commander of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, the only all -Black, all-female Women's Army Corps unit deployed during WWII, whom we reviewed in the pages of the November 2024 Post Newsletter reference the DOD Mandate for all U.S. Army Posts and Forts named in honor of Confederate Officers be redesignated under a new, socially appropriate, name. The Post formerly known as Fort Lee, VA has been redesignated as Fort Gregg **Adams**, VA.


The American Legion – Still Serving

Many of you know **Legionnaire Ron Stachevich** or as he is more commonly known, "**Stach**." Ron is an Air Force Veteran who is retired and lives in the area. He is a long-time member of Post 712 and an all-round great guy. After the December Post Meeting we were sitting around talking during the 712 Social Hour and Ron mentioned he was afforded the opportunity to participate in **Honor Flight 13** during April 2024. If you're not familiar with the Honor Flight Program it is a wonderful program that honors Veterans for their service. As noted in their Mission Statement:

"Honor Flight Pittsburgh recognizes our American Veterans for their sacrifices and achievements by transporting them to ... Washington D.C. to visit those memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifice."

It's a long day for the Vet's leaving about 4:00 AM and returning about 11:00 PM, but all needs are provided for and each Vet is assigned a **Volunteer Guardian** whose job is to stay with the Vet throughout the day to assist with movement and such. 

Mission 13 April 2024 **Stach** also shared some of his experiences in the Air Force, particularly his assignment to **Goose Bay Air Force Base in Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada**. Stach was there during the 1950's. Being an Army Vet, I had never heard of Goose Bay AFB, so I did a little research, Goose Bay Air Force Base was built during 1942 and has remained active all this time. Today it houses the Royal Canadian Air Force 5 Wing, which supports the **North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD)** and allied air forces. Goose Bay is also home to a

How Do I Request Military Awards and Decorations?

For the Veteran: in general, the military will work replacement medal requests for the veteran at no cost. This includes family members with the <u>signed authorization</u> of the veteran.

For the Next-of-Kin: the process (and cost) for replacement medals requests differs among the service branches and is dependent upon who is requesting the medal, particularly if the request involves an archival record.

For the General Public: if the service member separated from military service more than 62 years ago, the public may <u>purchase a copy of the veteran's Official Military Personnel File (OMPF)</u> to determine the awards due and obtain the medals from a commercial source. If the service member separated **less than 62 years ago**, the public may request such information from the OMPF via the Freedom of Information Act.

Robert F. Reitmeyer August 29th, 2024 American Legion Post 712

Age 86, of the Borough of Whitehall (Pittsburgh), passed away peacefully on Thursday, August 29, 2024. Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA, Bob graduated from South Hills High School and Duquesne University. He is survived by his wife Regina, son Rich-

ard, daughter Rebecca, sisters Suzanne (Paul) Schrenk and Annys Laufer, brothers Timothy (Sheryl) Reitmeyer and Thomas (Kelly) Reitmeyer, and sister-in-law Barbara Reitmeyer, plus countless cousins, nieces, and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents and brothers Harry and David.

Bob's career as a helicopter pilot began in the Navy, where he earned his wings, toured the Mediterranean Sea on the USS Taconic, then served on two cruises aboard the USS Edisto, an icebreaker that took him to both the Arctic Circle and Antarctica. Following active duty, he joined the Navy Reserves in Lakehurst, NJ, for a few years before joining the Pennsylvania Army National Guard in Washington, PA, for over 20 years, where he formed many cherished and lifelong friendships. He parlayed his military experience to work as a fixed-wing plane and helicopter pilot for Consol Coal, where he regularly frustrated coworkers with his early morning cheerfulness and occasionally took his children with him on day trips to Washington, DC.

Bob made friends wherever he went, and stayed busy in his retirement by joining groups such as the Streets Run Watershed Association and Baldwin Historical Society. He was a longtime member of a succession of local gyms, where he spent far more time talking with the other regulars than working out.

His quick smile, happy laugh, easygoing manner, continual support of his family, unwavering pride in his children, ongoing struggle with the squirrel and the birdfeeder, and endless supply of sawdust will be missed.

- ♦ Yes, Post 712 does have a SAL Squadron. Annual dues are \$9. Give us a call

American Legion Riders Membership Requirements

- ♦ Be a member in good standing with the American Legion, the SAL or the ALA
- ♦ Be the legally registered owner or spouse of a motorcycle
- ♦ Be properly licensed and insured as required by law
- ♦ Riders Chapter 712 meet the 1st Wednesday of the month at 7 PM.
