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— MEETING NOTES —

Post 712 held its regularly scheduled Meeting on the third Tuesday of the month, February 20th, at 7 PM. If you were not there you missed a good meeting.

First Vice Commander Lloyd Ray chaired the meeting and came well prepared to keep the positive momentum rolling. Lloyd made a motion to ensure the Post could sponsor short notice requests such as a school or scouting event, or community program, between regularly scheduled Post Meetings, as such opportunities pop up quickly and often require a decision within a day or two. An example he cited is Post 712 recently sponsored the *Thomas Jefferson High School Baseball Team*. The Executive Board now has the authority to conduct a vote on such short-suspense opportunities. The motion passed unanimously. *Lloyd capped*



the motion at \$500 a month and the program is limited to a 6 months trial basis at which time the Membership will evaluate the success of program for continuation or elimination.

Any such request must be passed by a majority vote of the Executive Board at which it will then be reported to the Membership at the next Post Meeting.

More great news on the topic of donations, Second Vice Commander John Dillon reviewed the merits of Operation Troop Appreciation (OTA) and made a motion to begin donating \$100 a month to OTA to support the excellent work they do in supporting Veterans in need and Active Duty Service Members deployed to the far corners of the earth. The donations are scheduled for 2024 for \$100 a month, not to exceed a total donation of \$1,100. The Membership voted on the motion which passed unanimously. Well Done Post



712 in supporting such an outstanding organization. All employees of OTA are volunteers. Each person donates their time and efforts and does not accept pay or financial benefit; they do it for the love of helping Veterans and Service Members—this is the type of organization Post 712 wants to support through donations and thru volunteer hours!!! (www.operationtroopappreciation.org).

And into every life a little rain must fall. Post 712 was notified by American Legion National of dues increase. Currently Post 712 dues are \$30 a year. Of that \$30, Post 712 receives only \$3. The remaining \$27 is forwarded to American Legion National and the Department of Pennsylvania American Legion (You read that correctly, Post 712 pays \$27 out of \$30 dues for every member). Finance Officer Thad Weidmann and Lloyd explained this process to the Membership. However, National is now raising dues to keep up with the high cost of ... well, everything these days. National has raised their dues \$7, meaning Post 712 must now pay \$34 for every Post Member. Thad and Lloyd noted that some Posts charge \$5, \$10, and even \$15 above the mandatory dues as a way of making money off their own Membership. Thad explained the reason Post \$712 charges only \$3 more than the mandatory membership fee is to cover the cost of postage, paper and envelopes as Post 712 must mail ID cards to members who do not attend meetings. All present were in favor of not making money from our own Members.

Staff Judge Nick Krawec suggested the Post raise dues by the mandatory amount required by National only to maintain a \$3 buffer to pay assorted costs such as postage, to which all agreed. In this manner we do not lose money thru

mailing ID cards and we simultaneously keep our dues as low as possible. A motion was made and passed unanimously.

Post 712 dues will now be \$37 annually, which remains one of the least expensive annual dues of American Legion Posts within PA. There is no impact to Paid Up For Life (PUFL) Members. Thanks to the Membership for walking through this challenge and establishing a great plan moving forward!

Post 712 is now actively, even aggressively, supporting community programs thru sponsorships, donations and perhaps most impactful of all, through volunteering efforts. Not only is <u>Post 712</u> fully operational, but the <u>Chapter 712 American Legion Riders</u> & <u>Post 712 Legion Auxiliary (ALA)</u> are operational and accepting new members. The Post Newsletter has been expanded to get the word out and all members are highly encouraged to attend our monthly meetings to stay informed and to become an active part of something special we are building—Top.

<u>WELCOME HOME</u> VIETNAM VETERANS HOLIDAY – MARCH 29TH

Honors all Vets who served on Active Duty from November 1, 1955 to March 15, 1975

We know about Armed Forces Day, celebrated on the third Saturday of May, and Memorial Day, celebrated on the last Monday of May, and even Veterans Day, celebrated on November 11th, however did you know about National Vietnam War Veterans Day, celebrated on <u>March 29th</u>, or as it is often referred, <u>Vietnam Veterans Welcome Home Day</u>?

During 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed into law the *Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act of 2017* designating March 29th of each year as <u>National Vietnam War Veterans Day</u>. It is a day we remember and honor those Veterans who served on <u>active duty</u> during the Vietnam era which is designated as <u>November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975</u> whether stationed in-Country or anywhere in the world. It is a day we also pause to remember those who never came home and our POWs, especially those for whom our Nation has yet to account.

March 29th was chosen to honor Vietnam era Veterans as on that date in 1973, the <u>United States Military Assistance Command, Vietnam</u> (MACV) was disestablished and it is also the day the last of the U.S. combat troops departed Vietnam. In addition, it was about this time Hanoi released the last of the POWs they acknowledged holding.

Did you know that despite the Hollywood stereotype most Vietnam Veterans were Volunteers. Nearly 9 million persons served on active duty during 1964—1973, of which 3.4 million deployed to Southeast Asia and 2.7 million served in South Vietnam. Out of all persons on active duty, 2.2 million were drafted and only about 25% of troops in combat zones were drafted. Further, the unemployment rate for Vietnam Veterans has been only about 4.8% over the years while the unemployment rate for the rest of society has been far higher about 6.2%. The last thing you should know is that 1,584 Vietnam Service Members are

still unaccounted for and are waiting to come home.

SOMEONE YOU SHOULD KNOW Ed Harmon — "Big Tool"



Ed Harmon or as he is known to the Legion Riders, "Big Tool" grew up in the Knoxville – Allentown area of Pittsburgh as the second oldest of 8 kids. Today he serves as an Executive-at-Large for Post 712 and Road Captain of the 712 Legion Riders. Ed always has a good story to tell and is willing to lend a hand and help anyone in need. If this sounds right to you attend a Post 712 Meeting and join the Brotherhood and Sisterhood of the American Legion.

As many Pittsburgh youth Ed wanted to join the Military as he was searching for something

without even knowing what it was. His father, Edward Harmon served during WWII aboard the USS Savanah, a Light Cruiser that was part of the Armada that carried President Roosevelt to the Yalta Conference. The Savanah and her crew earned 3 Battle Stars and decorations during multiple engagements.

The Korean War ended in 1953. Ed had wanted to enlist but was prohibited from doing so because of his age at the time, 16 years old. However, a year later,

when he turned 17, he enlisted as an Infantryman in the Army earning \$150 a month plus he volunteered to join the Airborne and earn another \$50 a month in "Jump Pay." Though the draft was active, he did not wait to be called. Ed attended Basic Training at Fort Knox, KY; Infantry Training at Fort Jackson, SC and finally, for Airborne Training it was back to KY at Fort Campbell.





One of Ed's most vivid memories is from Airborne Training when he was outside in formation. It had snowed and the ground was covered with intermittent puddles of water. The Airborne Trainer ordered a Lieutenant (LT), to sit down on the ground. The LT was standing in a puddle so he took one step to the side and promptly sat as ordered. The Instructor advised the LT his instructions were to sit-down, not to side step and then sit-down. The message was clear. Exacting adherence to orders, no excep-

tions, not even for Officers, it's the Airborne Way or the Highway.

When asked if he was apprehensive about attending Airborne Training Ed recounted a story that shortly before he enlisted, he was playing a pickup game of football in the neighborhood. Well, things being what they were, Ed got into a tussle with a Veteran of the famed 187th Airborne Regiment, Rakkasans. Ed bested the man and after that figured he could handle anything the Rakkasan had been able to handle including Airborne Training – **Pittsburgh Logic!**

Upon earning his "Wings" Ed learned the 508th Airborne Infantry Regiment, the famed "Red Devils" were moving to Japan. Ed volunteered for the 508th and


shortly thereafter found himself on a C-17 Globe Master jet enroute to Beppu City on the southern most island. Ed was excited as Beppu was known as the Florida of Japan and he was looking forward to fun in the sun! Little did Ed realize when he got there he would spend most of the next year training amongst the snowcovered peaks of the Mt. Tsurumi Mountains— You're in the Army Now!!!


Though he spent allot of time in the mountains Ed had ample opportunity to intermingle with the Japanese people who left an impression on him. At first, he experienced culture shock, though he came to realize the Japanese were among the most friendly, polite, and honorable people he has ever met to this day.

After a year in Japan Ed returned to the U.S. on a slow boat and remarked that was the time to find out if you were claustrophobic – he was not, but soldiers were packed into the ship on bunks that were stacked 5 – 6 bunks high.



Ed reported to Fort Campbell, KY, with the 101st Airborne Division which was in the process of changing from Airborne to Air Assault. While there he worked as a Radio Telephone Operator (RTO), with a Forward Observer keeping track of the M-10 Plotting Board and calling in Fire Missions. He enjoyed the duty as it required planning, team work, and attention to detail and these were attributes he was learning to appreciate through his Army experiences.

During his 3 years in the Army, Ed made a total of 21 "jumps" all using a standard T-10 parachute. After leaving the Army Ed continued "jumping" as a hobby and made another 15 jumps with the Monyok Sky Divers Club in Monroeville, PA, where he earned a trophy for accuracy. One of his most memorable jumps was as a civilian and was less than accurate during which the wind got ahold of his chute and blew him off course. Ed worked the downs of his chute but



could not get back on course and ended up landing in the back yard of someone who was having a BBQ party. The homeowner yelled at Ed to get the *h*ll* out of his yard and off his property, which Ed promptly obliged collecting his parachute as fast as he could (*Obviously, this home owner was not a Veteran, or he would have invited Ed in for BBQ*).

After the Army Ed returned to Pittsburgh and took a job on the <u>railroad</u> for 5 years. It paid the bills but was not satisfying to him. During this time he realized the Army imparted in him structure, discipline and an appreciation for being a part of a team. The Army was a way of life in which each Soldier felt unwavering loyalty and trust in his Brothers and Ed appreciated these qualities. Soon thereafter he became an **Iron Worker**. *It was with the Iron*



Workers he once again felt at home with a Brotherhood, much like the Army. As an Iron Worker Ed traveled extensively to jobs in California, New York, Puerto Rico, and Texas among many other locations. He was part of some of the largest constructions and renovations in the area including building the Birmingham Bridge, the Harbor Tunnel (Baltimore), the West End Bridge, the McKees Rocks Bridge, the McKeesport – Duquesne Bridge and even putting a new roof on Duquesne University's Old Main (office building).

Though busy often hundreds of feet above the ground (or river), Ed found time to meet the love of his life, **Ms.** Audrey Supp, to which they settled down in Pleasant Hills and had four children. Ed joined the Jefferson Soccer Club and became a kids coach, referee and President of the Soccer Association over a 12 year span. Ed explained his son, Jimmy, was playing soccer and Ed did not like the way the association was being run as it was unorganized and not especially good for the kids. Knowing what he had to do, Ed became involved in the Association and held an array of positions during that time. Simultaneously, Ed was in an Over 30 Men's Soccer League and still in "Airborne" shape as he ran 4 miles nearly every night up and down Old Clairton Road.

Ed is a long-time Legionnaire and related he joined the Legion for the camaraderie with other Veterans as the Legion brings together the Brotherhood of Veter-

ans, of men and women with similar experiences and beliefs that those who did not Serve may not fully understand.
These days his



hobbies include volunteering with the Legion and local charities such as Operation Troop Appreciation. He can still be seen going up and down Old Clairton Road these days, but now he is on a Harley Davidson rather than jogging. /// Top

WHAT'S IN A NAME? - CONFEDERATE NAMES

Dept of Defense Directive to rechristen U.S. Army Installations named in honor of the Confederacy

The first of nine articles — LTG HAROLD MOORE

What do these Army Posts have in common? Fort A.P. Hill, Fort Benning, Fort Bragg, Fort Gordon, Fort Hood, Fort Lee, Fort Pickett, Fort Polk, & Fort Rucker?

If you said they are all named after Confederate Generals, you are correct. A few of these forts are legendary in Military history such as Fort Benning, Home of the Infantry, the Rangers, and Army Snipers. Fort Bragg is Home to the U.S. Military Special Operations Command and the 18th Airborne Corp, including the famed 82nd Airborne Division.

However, the **Department of Defense** (DOD) directed all Branches of the Service to rename all forts, buildings, bases, weapons,



or anything else, that were previously named in honor of the Confederacy to a name in keeping with the awareness and appropriateness of society today. This

was an appropriate order for the DOD to issue especially when you consider the <u>Civil War ended 170 years ago and race and the Confederacy continue as a divisive topic</u> today.

I support the name change but must admit as a graduate of the U.S. Infantry School at Fort Benning it stung a bit for this iconic fort to be renamed given its place history. Now I must purchase new t-shirts as my Ft. Benning Alumni shirt has become outdated. The DOD Directive

required all renaming ceremonies to be completed no later than January 1, 2024.

You already know who Fort Moore is named after even if you do not realize it.


Fort Moore is named after Lieutenant General (LTG) (3 Stars) Harold "Hal" Moore and his wife Julia, who both made meaningful and lasting contributions to the Army. LTG Moore is best remembered as the Lieutenant Colonial (LTC) in command of the 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment at the Battle of Ia Drang in 1965 during the Vietnam War.



LTG Moore co-authored the book, We were Soldiers Once ... and Young, 1992, which was made into the 2002 movie starring Mel Gibson, We Were Soldiers (Sam Elliot plays Sergeant Major Basil Plumley - Ed).

LTG Moore served in World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War. He was a graduate of United States Military Academy West Point and during his career he commanded the 3rd Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division (Gary Owen Brigade), and the 7th Infantry Division among other units (7th ID was affectionately known as the "rag heads" for their penchant of wearing drooping camouflage on their helmets). LTG Moore was highly decorated having been awarded the Army Distinguished Service Cross (4) and the Army Distinguished Service Medal among many other awards.


Troops that served with LTC Moore at the **Battle of Ia Drang** affectionately referred to him as, "**Yellow Hair**" as given their situation of being surrounded by the enemy and heavily outnumbered, it was their respectful way of referencing LTC Moore to a previous LTC who commanded the 7th Cavalry, **George Armstrong Custer at the Battle of the Little Big Horn,** whom Native Americans called "Yellow Hair."—*Soldiers Humor—gotta love it!*



A little known fact is that Moore was wounded by *punji stakes* in Vietnam and received the **Purple Heart Medal**. However, his wounds were superficial and he refused the medal saying he was not a deserving recipient. When he was not permitted to refuse the medal by Army Brass, he then refused to wear the medal as a sign of respect to those soldiers who died or sustained grievous bodily wounds.

LTG Moore was born in Kentucky in 1922 and died during 2017 at 94 years of age in Alabama. He is buried in the cemetery at Ft Benning, Ft Moore, GA alongside his wife Julie Moore. He served for 32 years (1945-1977) and co-authored two books, the second being, We Are Soldiers Still: A Journey Back to the Battlefields of Vietnam.

LTC Moore is credited with developing training techniques and executing Air Cavalry tactics that enhanced the effectiveness and laid the ground work for future Air Cavalry operations, which are still being used today.
